Flip Flop Materials What are they made from?

Typically made from low cost materials like plastics, rubber, foam and other materials

Chemicals are added to give gloss, toughness, heat & stress resistance as well as colour

The strap is made from more elastic material such as PVC plastic or vulcanised rubber

Flip-flops are inexpensive, costing as little as USD 5 or less in most parts of the world

Ancient Egyptians

The earliest recorded flip flops date back to the Ancient Egyptians around 4,000 BC. The Japanese popularised the modern flip flop based on their 'Zori' shoes made from rubber and foam after WW2

50+ Million Pairs manufactured every year

Sri Lanka has the capacity to manufacture an estimated 50 million pairs of flip flops per year. The average Sri Lankan buys at least 2 pairs of flip flops per year with almost no means of recycling them until now
