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Laura Crane Youth Cancer Trust:

- Cancer is the most common form of non-accidental death in teenagers and young adults in the UK.
- Every day in the UK seven young people (aged between 13 and 24) are diagnosed with cancer.
- The Laura Crane Youth Cancer Trust (LCYCT) is a local charity with national reach that supports 13 24 year olds during and after their fight with cancer.
- The Trust raises money to <u>fund medical and social research into cancers that affect the</u> <u>13-24-year-old age group and</u> provides support mechanisms, such as technology, to remove feelings of isolation and improve time spent on hospital wards for young cancer patients and reinforce their fight.
- The Trust provides grants to young cancer patients to provide equipment or activities that improve their quality of life during and after cancer and its treatments.
- To Trust works with 45 hospitals across the UK, as well as collaboratively with other organisations to reach young cancer patients that need support.
- The Laura Crane Youth Cancer Trust was founded by the late Jacquie Roeder not long after her daughter Laura died of cancer in 1996, as a lasting legacy to someone who lived life to the full.
- The Laura Crane Youth Cancer Trust runs National Youth Against Cancer Week to raise awareness of cancer in young people and raise funds to help fight cancer in teenagers and young adults
