

MANDA WILDERNESS CHOIR FESTIVAL 2015 SET FOR NEW STAGE

Tuesday 18 August, 2015

The annual Manda Wilderness Choir Festival in northwestern Mozambique is all set to burst onto a purpose-built new stage in Cobue, Niassa Province with its intoxicating mix of song and dance on Saturday, September 5.

The Festival, now in its sixth year, will relocate from the steps of Cobue's main church to an impressive open community space alongside the area's only secondary school. Choirs drawn from every village in the surrounding region will compete to impress a panel of music professionals and a local audience of all ages and backgrounds.

The open-air stage has been built by the Manda Wilderness Community Trust, a UK-based charity which helps to support education, agriculture and conservation in an area of African wilderness the size of greater London. The Festival itself is supported by the Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation (www.andrewlloydwebberfoundation.com); in addition to providing funding for the event itself, the Foundation finances a Guest Choral Director to provide professional training to the choirs in each village of the Manda Wilderness.

This year's Director, Jay Richardson, works with MWCT's local Community Project Manager Richard Stephano in thirteen villages, as well as with the Manda Wilderness Choir, an elite ensemble of singers made up of one representative from each village. Jay describes working on the Festival as one of the most refreshing experiences of his musical life.

"It's been a huge challenge and has brought a steep learning curve, but I've been overwhelmed by the enthusiasm and commitment of everyone involved," he says. "I feel that Richard and I have achieved fantastic results already, and I've enjoyed every step of the journey."

Richard views the Festival as "one of best events in the Manda Wilderness region; it brings unity among the people from all the villages we have in the area. It is also very interesting to see young people from all villages come together to form the Manda Wilderness Choir, in which they learn more techniques that will help them to be good musicians in the future. I would like to thank the Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation for its support."
