Perhaps the most eagerly anticipated development in Moura's career is his return to directing with the film *Last Night at the Lobster*. Based on the novel by Stewart O'Nan, this intimate story unfolds in a snowbound seafood restaurant on its final night of service. Moura will not only direct the film but also star in it — marking his first directorial work since 2019's politically charged *Marighella*. The story's confined setting and emotional stakes make it a perfect vehicle for Moura's talent for subtlety and psychological tension, both in front of and behind the camera.

Moura's ongoing interest in projects rooted in Brazilian history and culture is also evident in *Angicos*, a film currently in development. The movie centres on the life of Paulo Freire, the revolutionary Brazilian educator whose literacy methods sparked a cultural movement in the 1960s. Moura is set to play Freire, engaging once more with a politically rich and historically resonant narrative. As with *Marighella*, *Angicos* reflects Moura's commitment to telling stories that speak not only to Brazil's past but also to its ongoing social and political dynamics.
